- 13. Find three "wild words" in your reading that you consider to be new, interesting, beautiful, colorful, funny, or crazy. Write them down, and then use each in an original sentence.
- 14. What did you like about the book jacket (the cover)?
- 15. If the book was about animals instead of people, what animal would the main character be? Why?
- 16. Which character interested you the most and why?
- 17. What is the **conflict** (the problem) in the story?
- 18. What is the **climax** of the story?
- 19. Did the character(s) learn something in the story?
